





Jill's first visit to a bile farm left her shocked and sickened... but she was also determined to help as many bears as she could. Tiny Franzi was one of the lucky ones.

619 bears saved from shocking cruelty in China and Vietnam. Almost all from bile farms.



Meet the bears vou saved from shocking cruelty

From unthinkable abuse to a love they've never known... eight more precious bears joined our family in 2018. All because of you.

These broken animals endured a combined <u>111 years</u> of heart-wrenching cruelty. Today they're safe at our Vietnam sanctuary. Each day a little stronger. A little less nervous. Slowly they're emerging from their trauma... and learning to be the bears they were born to be.

Moon bears Kim, Mai, Mekong, Newtie, LeBON, Sky and Precious, and sun bear Aurora, never have to fear again. And with every new day, and every new adventure, they're thanking you from the heart.

All are already enjoying the great outdoors, except for sweet little Mai. Mai is blind, so understandably nervous about going outside. But we're sure that in time she'll be happily pottering around on the grass, just like our other blind bears.



This is how we found poor Kim. Frightened and stressed. Weaving back and forth in her cage. Half her tongue missing. Teeth broken and rotting. And this beautiful, desperate bear had been caged for 13 long years.



Back at our sanctuary, Kim was soon feeling better. Dental surgery removed years of extreme pain. And lots of good, healthy food and loving care meant this gorgeous girl was soon ready to move into her very own den.



Just six months on from her rescue, Kim surprised us all by marching out onto the grass the very first time we gave her outdoor access. She's such a brave and determined little bear. Her favourite spot outside is on the wooden platform.



Aurora was extremely stressed when we arrived to take her home. Caged for 15 years as an exotic pet, she was already middle-aged and arthritic. Aurora had been poached in the wild as a cub. Now at last... you've opened her cage.



Five weeks later, this precious little bear - one of the smallest bears at our sanctuary – was busy exploring her den, the largest space she'd even known. She loved building comfy nests and climbing up her wooden platform.



This February, Aurora took her first cautious steps outside, tempted by the treats laid out for her... coconuts, jam, tropical fruit... Today this sweet little bear has some new sun bear friends... and a whole new life of fun.



In October, Precious became our 200th rescued Vietnamese bear. This poor girl had been in agony for years... she badly needed dental work, and had an ingrown claw. We couldn't wait to get her home.




We numbed her pain with medication... and the relief on her face was clear. This gorgeous bear finally has all the care she needs. And after 17 lonely years in a cage, she deserves all the love in the world





Pain-free and stronger by the day, Precious is already showing us her playful side... by December she could touch her toes. And as winter set in, she built comfy nests by piling up all the straw in her den in one cosy corner.



What a heart-breaking sight. Mekong was clearly depressed when our rescue team came for him. And no wonder. He'd been trapped in this hellhole for years. And his rotting teeth were causing him terrible pain.









Newtie broke our hearts when he looked up from his cage. Years of confinement and abuse had left him broken and depressed... he also had painful fractured teeth. We showered him with love on his long road trip home.



Major dental surgery took away Newtie's pain, and soon his gentle nature started shining through. He's also proving to be quite the ladies' man. By early October, this lovely boy had made a friend in blind Mai.



Newtie was such a brave boy when we let him outdoors for the very first time... his nose was twitching as he headed straight for the fruity treats left outside his den. This beautiful bear now spends his days playing with friends.



Poor little Mai. Not only was she caged and abused for years... the cruel bile trade has stolen her sight. She was such a sweetie on her journey to our sanctuary. snuggling up tight in a bed of soft leaves.



A month on, and this dear little bear was happily living in a den and busily destroying log chews, rope toys and puzzle feeders filled with tasty treats... all precious gifts of love from you to her



Help couldn't have come soon enough for Sky. Thanks to a poor diet, she was the heaviest bear we'd ever rescued. She had curvature of the spine and hard, thick skin on much of her back from sitting in a cage for 14 years.



By the time she was ready to move to a den, Sky was still very cautious of her carers. But soft, kind words and sweet sticky treats slowly won her over. And for this precious girl, we had all the time in the world



Four weeks on, Mekong was one of the lucky bears chosen

for surgery by visiting dental specialist Dr Cedric Tutt. Cedric

regularly donates his time and skills to our bears... and

thanks to his kindness, Mekong's pain is gone.

By February, Mai was bravely standing at the open door of her den. Not quite ready for her next big adventure, but she can take all the time she needs... and maybe, just maybe, we'll be able to restore her sight.



When Sky was first given outdoor access, she'd edge out to grab some treats then quickly retreat indoors. But this gorgeous brave bear has put her fears aside... and thanks to you, she's finally claiming her time in the sun.

This poor bear had spent <u>over a decade</u> abused and neglected on a bile farm. He didn't even have a name.


Finally LeBON is getting the love and care he needs. He's growing stronger every day...

LeBON had major dental surgery... taking away his pain forever. In his den, he discovered the joys of play, and demolished his log chew toys with relish – finally able to chew without pain.



Today LeBON is a world away from the horrors he endured. Now he loves to play all day and wrestle on the grass with friends like Sky (right). Rolling and tumbling in blissful abandon... with the big blue sky above.

Tim was the most courageous, venturing over the concrete 'patio' outside the dens and onto the grass the very first day he had access. But even then, he ducked back inside several times... just to make sure he could!

Over time, gentle Tim encouraged others to join him on the grass. Mana is blind, so was understandably nervous, but eventually he followed his friend Tim... and a world of wonders opened up for this brave and precious bear.



At first, blind Mana preferred the safety of his den to venturing outside. But with the help of a friend, this fabulously fluffy boy has learned to love foraging on the grass.



Gorgeous Anh Sang can't decide what to play with first! It took time for this sweet little bear to feel confident outdoors. But now she can't wait to go out in the mornings.

It's such a special moment when rescued bears are ready to go outside. It means they've come through years of horrifying abuse... and months of gentle healing.

End Bear Bile Farming

Bringing them home

Your kind gifts allowed us to continue our work to find lifelong homes for all caged bears in Vietnam.

This means freeing up space at our sanctuary, upgrading existing rescue facilities throughout the country, and building new sanctuaries.

Animals Asia has the mammoth task of relocating all the bears to sanctuaries by 2022. This follows our groundbreaking agreement with the government in 2017. Currently around 600 bears are still on bile farms.



We're showing existing rescue centres affordable ways to keep their bears happy and occupied... like this simple log swing. In 2018, we created and distributed to wildlife rescue centres throughout Vietnam a bilingual manual on the care and rehabilitation of sun bears and moon bears.



After joining other animal carers for a week of bear care training at our Vietnam sanctuary, Nguyen Minh Hue hopes to introduce some positive changes at the government wildlife shelter where she works. Our visitors from Pu Mat and Hoang Lien rescue centres learned about everything from nutrition and record-keeping to preparing enrichment (like toys, puzzle-feeders, leafy browse and jam smears) and how to behave around bears to ease their stress.

What comes next?

We need to find out the exact number of bears on farms, how many sanctuaries to upgrade and build, potential locations and funding solutions. Then there's management responsibilities and the logistics of moving hundreds of bears from farms to safety – most farms are small family-run businesses holding two or three bears.

Wasn't bear bile farming already illegal in Vietnam?

Yes, but under certain conditions it was still legal to keep bears in cages for tourists or as 'pets'. Many of these bears were illegally tapped for their bile.

It's lucky the bears like to snuggle up...

... because that's what we're urging them to do at our Vietnam sanctuary... where every new space is another life saved.

Over 2018, the bears made 135 new friendships, with integrations into bigger groups freeing up space for even more rescues! Some bears made just one new friend, while others like friendly Bi Xanh made 20. But in the end we made sure that every bear was happy and comfortable... and some lovely new bonds were forged.

Our heartfelt thanks to Italian brand **Miomojo** for part funding the Cub House at our Vietnam bear sanctuary. Miomojo makes gorgeous ethical fashion accessories.



At the end of 2018, we said a sad goodbye to Nicola Field who headed up the care of our China bears and staff... and devoted 12 years to improving every aspect of the bears' welfare. Thank you to the moon and back Nic for your incredible dedication and passion. We know you'll always carry the bears in your heart.

Hey ma, guess what I learned at school today?

Your kindness is shaping the future for Asia's bears... through the hearts and minds of its youth

In Vietnam, over 1,000 students and teachers took educational tours of our Vietnam sanctuary in 2018. And for those who couldn't make the journey, our staff went to them... giving presentations on bear farming to almost 1,700 students in their schools and villages.

We also involve children in community projects, like our 10 Vietnamese herb gardens growing over 5,000 plants for use as alternatives to bear bile.



Education is key in China too. In 2018, we held over 40 events in schools and local communities, spreading awareness of animal welfare to over 120,000 people.



With your support, we organised 10 free health checks for over 2,000 people in Phung Thuong village – a bear farming hotspot in Vietnam. At the sessions, 44 traditional doctors gave advice on alternatives to bear bile and prescribed more than 2,100 bottles of herbal medicine.

You're their 'apple a day'

Keeping our bears healthy and pain-free is one of your most precious gifts.

From taking away years of dental pain and giving them back their sight... to clipping their nails and cleaning their ears... your support means everything to the bears in our care.

Our sanctuary vet teams performed **294** health checks under anaesthesia on the bears in 2018 – that's nearly one a day!

Our Vietnam bears received

82 sets of medications a day! That's nearly

30,000 sets over the year... all hidden in tempting treats like bananas and fruit shakes.

Our vet team toured Chinese cities to teach over

1,650 vets and vet students about anaesthesia, pain management and animal welfare.

Why bear bile?

It's used in traditional medicine... and when used properly, it can have anti-inflammatory properties. But herbal and synthetic alternatives are cheaper, safer and more effective.



Lovely Francis was one of 27 lucky China bears to be checked by visiting cardio specialist Chris Linney in 2018. Thank you Chris for healing the broken hearts of so many special bears.

Every step for the bears

Kat Savage spent 90 days walking the entire length of Britain – all for the bears and other animals in need.

Kat, a singer from Cornwall in England, left behind her comfortable home and endured ice and snow, painful blisters and a swollen knee to walk 1,400km to raise funds for Animals Asia.



Kat has also recorded a song for us and even has our logo tattooed on her back. Thanks for everything Kat!

In 2018, we released a Vietnamese language book on how to grow 32 herbal alternatives to bear bile. We

hope to encourage Vietnam's bile users to switch to medicinal herbs.



You brought them in from the cold

Dry beds, heaters and warm showers took the misery out of winter for thousands of strays in struggling animal shelters around China.

With your generous help, we outfitted 13 animal shelters in 13 Chinese cities with bathtubs, heaters, dryers, fur-trimmers, cat climbing furniture, beds and fencing... and completely refurbished three shelters, benefitting over 4,000 animals across the country.

Below are just some of the ways you helped these desperate animals in 2018:



Rescued dogs played and rested on clean, dry surfaces in the shade. Because of you, the Hefei Dog Association Small Animal Care Centre has a new sunshade and paving.



Dogs stayed dry and warm at Jiangxi Xinyu Stray Dog Shelter. You gave them raised beds, reducing the chance of skin disease from sleeping on the wet floor.



Dogs and cats enjoyed warm showers. Your gifts funded a bathtub and hot water shower at Tangshan Small Animal Protection Association shelter.

In 2018, we provided handson trap, neuter, return (TNR)

training for **40** staff and volunteers with eight NGOs from three Chinese cities.

Since 2007, Animals Asia has worked with the Chinese government and local animal

welfare groups in cities. As a direct result, many provinces have ditched cruel culls and set up humane population control programmes for dogs and cats.

That's right. Nearly 27,000!

More than 26,000 shelter animals have benefitted from your support since 2014 (roughly 24,800 dogs and 2,000 cats). This is under our Shelter Improvement Project that targets the shelters most in need of urgent help to upgrade their facilities.

Thanks to your kind gifts, we've been able to work with over 50 of these struggling animal shelters in 38 cities around China, and the lives of their rescued dogs and cats have improved beyond measure.

We also work with the authorities in these cities, offering advice and practical help in areas like population and disease control. In total, Animals Asia works with 158 grassroots groups around China, providing a range of help, from shelter management training to emergency disaster relief.


Our best friends' best friend

Seeing is believing

Around 90,000 Chinese university students learned about animal welfare from our new poster exhibition, funded by your kind gifts.

Winning entries from Animal Asia's 2018 Design Competition, with the theme #No to Animal Abuse, toured 90 universities across China from November to December bringing a message of animal protection to a vast audience.

Irene Feng, who heads our work for cats and dogs in China, said the posters encouraged the students to consider animal welfare in their everyday lives and decision-making. What to eat, how to be entertained, what forms of medicine to use and whether to adopt a companion animal.

A recent online poll by

This exhibition makes it clear that animals are not much different to humans. They have emotions and complex inner lives. And animal cruelty can never be tolerated.

Our grateful thanks to Kadoorie Charitable Foundation of Hong Kong for funding our work to end dog and cat eating in Guangxi, China. This exciting project, which tackles all aspects of the cruel trade, could become a model around the country.

A four-year investigation by Animals Asia into the dog meat trade revealed widespread theft of dogs, lack of required vaccinations, a lack of health and proof of origin certificates, illegal transportation and unsanitary slaughter.

Chinese public speak up for 'meat dogs'

Just 12 months after we launched an online platform allowing the Chinese public to report suspected illegal activities by dog and cat meat restaurants, thousands of lives have been saved.

By the end of December 2018, we had 836 reports – more than two every single day. We verified each of them and reported them to the authorities.

Animals Asia began reporting dog and cat meat restaurants suspected of operating illegally via a network of volunteers in 2016. The online portal for public reporting was launched in early 2018.

Since 2016, the project has seen:

- 296 restaurants affected shut down, stopped from selling dog meat, given an official warning or inspected by officials and found to have no dog meat on the premises at that time.
- · Thousands of dogs saved.

When a touch is worth a thousand words

Autistic children in China felt the love of a dog for the very first time.

And from the moment they met, the children's faces lit up. They smiled. They reached out. And their parents and staff were amazed.

In the lead up to World Autism Day, a government hospital in Shenzhen, southern China opened its doors to six of our tail-wagging doctors for the very first time. Despite many years of visiting private facilities, our therapy dogs had never before been allowed in a state-run hospital in the city.

The hospital management admits there were concerns before the first visit, but these soon melted away once they saw the children's reaction.

The children learned that language is not the only way to communicate... a hug can create a connection too.

Over 12,000 people in nursing homes and hospitals enjoyed the company of our Dr Dogs in 251 visits – that's more than one visit every other day!

And in schools, our Professor Paws dogs and human volunteers were busy teaching over 6,000 children about cat and dog welfare.

Daily I see dogs, not only as our friends, but as counsellors to those with mental health challenges, teachers to those with no concept of animal welfare, and doctors to those in need of love and comfort.

Poor little Blodwyn had been neglected and used as a breeding machine until our lovely China vet team stepped in.

Now she gets the health care she needs, along with a big dose of love and kindness too.


Blodwyn is one of the lucky neighbourhood dogs getting regular visits from the vet team at our Chengdu bear sanctuary. Like most of these dogs, she'd lived a pretty miserable life.

Chained up day and night, fed a poor diet, and given no veterinary care, let alone affection.

On top of this, Blodwyn had had several litters in the years that we'd known her, with her family selling off the puppies. But finally we persuaded them to allow her to be neutered.

*Today Blodwyn is enormously friendly. She's no longer chained up and whenever she hears us near her house she'll come running for a belly rub and to thank us for taking care of her."

We've also persuaded other local families to agree to spay and neuter their cats and dogs. And slowly some are starting to walk their dogs. Over 120 officials and charity staff from 36 Chinese cities attended our eighth Dog Ownership Management Symposium. The two-yearly gathering is China's leading forum on dog management issues. To

date, more than 523 officials

from 51 cities have participated.

Your support means better vet care

Our vet teams are training vets from around China and Vietnam in small animal health care to boost welfare and foster respect for our furry friends.

A series of training sessions throughout 2018 taught the vets about treating common conditions like parvovirus, distemper and tropical skin diseases. Caring for the animals' welfare was an essential part of the course.


Improving vet care is a long-term goal for us. Too many dogs and cats receive either very poor health care or none at all.

The website stopped selling tickets to Le Mat Snake Village near Hanoi in response to our campaign...

Other wild animals too felt your kindness... elephants forced to carry passengers at Bali Elephant Camp, sun bears used as photo props at True Bali Experience, and orangutans made to box each other at Safari World in Thailand can expect fewer customers after TripAdvisor stopped promoting them (with a Certificate of Excellence!).

But the site continues to list other shows and restaurants offering similar cruelty. And that's why vou're so special to these animals... and why we're so thankful for your support. This could be a long campaign, but together, we will end this cruelty.

Dogs and cats not the answer

Vietnam's circuses say they will phase out the use of wild animals in performances.

But their plan to switch to domestic animals raises serious concerns. The Director of the Vietnam Circus Federation, Ta Duy Anh, made the announcement following the 2018 release of our damning report on wild animal shows in the country. But he gave no timeframe for the move.

Our report revealed 19 species were being forced to perform unnatural acts. Six of these were protected under Vietnamese law and their sale or exploitation for commercial purposes banned. A shocking 100% of the 16 facilities investigated failed to meet the animals' basic needs, with hundreds of animals being kept in isolation in tiny cages or chained up for long periods.

• Of course we'd welcome the end of wild animals in circuses, but switching to dogs and cats is not the answer. The same concerns remain – how they're housed, the methods used to train them and the tricks they have to perform.

Our grateful thanks to accessories company **Meraki** for raising much-needed funds for Animals Asia. To promote World Elephant Day on August 12, Meraki offered vegan cork wallets and bags decorated with beautiful hand-painted elephant designs — and 70% of profits went to our work.

Your support allowed our vet team to train

over 50 vets in Vietnamese zoos helping them to care for their animals more humanely.

Three macaques rescued from private owners now live in the care of our partners at Yok Don National Park. It's because of you that these three lonely animals now have companionship and get the care they need to live happy lives.



Our campaign to end the shocking Do Son Buffalo Fighting Festival in Vietnam continues, with your kind support. We persuaded the government to stop funding the 'festival'... but now it has private sponsorship. Before the fight, trainers sharpen their buffalo's horns to inflict maximum pain and suffering. They bang gongs in their buffaloes' ears, causing disorientation and stress, and making them enraged. And after the contest, the buffaloes are led out of the arena, maimed and bleeding, only to be killed so their meat can be sold. But you have our word... we won't stop fighting until there's <u>a total ban on such cruelty.</u>

- 1 Baby animals are snatched from the wild... because cute baby animals make better selfies.
- 2 They're often kept in small, dark spaces... chained or beaten.
- 3 Many are mutilated so they're safer for humans. Declawed, defanged... stripped of power.
- 4 They're frightened and humiliated... and often desperate for sleep.

Monkey show finally closed

A cruel macaque circus – shockingly sanctioned by UNESCO – has finally been forced to shut down. All because of your support.

Over 40,000 people signed our petition to force the UN body to honour its promise to close the circus at Can Gio Biosphere Reserve in Vietnam. When we wrote to UNESCO in 2016, they replied that the circus was 'a violation of bio-ethics and eco-ethics', and 'should be completely shut down.'

But it took another 18 months and nearly 43,000 signatures for the shows to finally end. Blindfolded macaques were forced to ride bicycles and cowered in fear from the ringmaster's whip during performances.

Two more cruel tourist sites dumped

Lonely Planet has stopped selling tours to Orchid and Monkey Island in opposition to their cruel animal performances.

In response to our request, the leading travel guide publisher pulled sales of tours to the Vietnamese islands from their site.

At Orchid Island and Monkey Island at Nha Trang macaques are strapped to dogs and forced to race, ostriches are ridden by day-trippers, and moon bears are muzzled in cruel circus performances.



A fun day out at Orchid Island is no fun for the animals. Every day is filled with terror and humiliation.



Monkey Island is no better. But thanks to your support, the pressure is now on these two sites to end their shows.

No more rides

Four beautiful elephants are no longer chained up waiting to give rides to tourists.

Instead they roam free in the forest. And tourists can watch them in their natural state, rather than riding on their backs.

Our ground-breaking ethical elephant tours in Vietnam's Yok Don National Park started in 2018. And already they're a hit.

This project has entirely changed the lives of the elephants at the park and it's also a much better experience for the tourists. Exploitation has been replaced with respect.

Thanks to your kind support in 2018, we continued our work to help Vietnam save its last wild elephants. We're providing welfare and management advice to the Dak Lak Elephant Conservation Centre in central Vietnam.

Alarmed that wild elephants were facing extinction, the government set up the centre as a breeding facility and hopes to reintroduce elephants to the wild in the future. It's also a sanctuary for rescued elephants.

Currently, while it's still under construction, there are only two residents. You might remember little Gold, who was rescued after falling down a well, and his friend Jun, who was injured in a hunter's snare.
