# FRIGHTENED KIM FINALLY MAKES A FRIEND

Thirteen years of cruelty on a Vietnamese bile farm left moon bear Kim too scared to play, but now she splashes in the pool with her new best friend.

Unlike many of our recovering bears, Kim had no fear of going outdoors, but for months she was scared of other bears. We tried introducing her to different bears, but she just wasn't ready... until she met Little Jane, and finally learned how to play.

Our rescued bears live in groups of up to 21 individuals. And finally we'd found a group just right for Kim... Little Jane and just two other middle-aged bears who prefer a quiet life. "It was a real struggle for Kim to find a community of bears she was comfortable with, but as soon as she met Little Jane it was love at first sight. Little Jane instantly started sniffing and nuzzling Kim and they spent a lot of time wrestling and playing with each other.

Since then, their relationship has gone from strength to strength and it was beautiful to see them explore their bubble-filled paddling pool together when we gave them special enrichment – they looked like two friends having a spa day!"

In 2017, Animals Asia signed a ground-breaking agreement with the Vietnam government to rescue all remaining bile bears. We have the momentous task of rescuing and homing all bears still suffering in bile cages. The official count is now

496 bears.

### **SUGAR AND SPICE**

Trapped in snares in the wild, these poor babies were forced to perform at a Vietnamese circus. And if it wasn't for you, they'd almost certainly still be there. Muzzled.... forced to walk on two legs... to carry buckets on a pole from their shoulders... and to ride motorbikes (and when they fell off, they were simply grabbed by the neck and thrown back on).

This is little Sugar and Spice in the barren cage they shared between performances... but your love brought them home.



# It took time for them to recover. Sugar (right) was particularly traumatised, but today they're happy beyond words... safe and loved because of you.

# SCOOBY, PHUONG, LILY & SWEET PEA

Welcome home, Scooby and friends. This special group had been held at a Vietnamese tourist resort. When the resort decided to close its bear display, we knew we had to get them quickly in case they were sold to a bile farm or circus. It was your generous donations that gave these bears sanctuary.



Scooby is a small bear, possibly stunted from a poor start in life. But he has a BIG personality. He's already showing his cheeky, playful nature and love for water. When he first arrived, he was so excited by honey that he tried to steal the spoon.



Phuong is such a lovely bear... gentle and shy. Sadly her vision is poor and she arrived needing many tooth extractions. We're hoping a visiting ophthalmologist might be able to restore her sight. Meanwhile she's pain-free and loving her new life.



With her sparkling eyes and tiny pink ears, gorgeous little Lily looks like a pixie... even with the horrific scar that runs right around her torso from an unimaginably painful snare injury. Thankfully the physical pain is long gone... and with each new day your healing love shows in every sweet smile.



Our sweetest little Sweet Pea... she needed an urgent dental that took away years of gnawing pain. She also needed surgery to remove a mango stone that she couldn't pass. She'd eaten the mango at the resort. (We always remove the stones when the bears are given mango.) Now this dear little bear is well and happy. She loves her life of sanctuary.



Caged and abused for 11 years for her bile, and abandoned on a noisy construction site, poor Phoenix was despondent and ill. She had no one. Until there was you. After surgery to remove her damaged gall bladder, and months of wholesome food and kind loving words, this precious bear is finally "home."

# AMY, THE LITTLE BEAR WE LOVED AND LOST

Severely underweight and dehydrated, missing a paw and half her tongue, little Amy lived for just 33 days in our care

It broke our hearts that we couldn't save this precious soul after she'd endured nearly 15 years of abuse in a bile cage. But at least we know that, thanks to you, Amy finally knew love.

"Since arriving at the sanctuary, her coat changed from sparse and coarse to luscious and fluffy. Her eyes, so sunken on arrival they looked like they were missing, shone with delight as she was given treats. She loved to be showered, she loved to roll around and she loved to play and nest with fresh leaves."

Valerie was hunched in her tiny cage when we came to rescue her from a Vietnamese circus school. She'd all but given up. The first thing we noticed was her sunken right eye. She also had a diseased molar that had probably caused her years of pain. But true to her name, this brave and valorous bear is trusting her instincts and slowly learning to become a bear.

This was Valerie's entire world (when she wasn't being forced to perform unnatural and terrifying circus tricks). Your kind gifts broke open her cage.



Valerie still has dry calluses on her head from rubbing it along the bars of her tiny cage. But with lots of TLC and good nutrition, these, along with her broken heart, are healing over time.

When Pearl Coatsworth said a final goodbye to her husband Ken just short of his 93rd birthday, he was wearing an Animals Asia bear T-shirt and clutching one of our leaflets to his heart. This very special couple from New Zealand worked tirelessly at stalls and events, and spoke relentlessly to the media. They lived and breathed the goal of ending bear bile farming. Our love and condolences to Pearl, and daughter Denise, who also cares so much for the bears, even visiting our sanctuary in Vietnam recently. What a truly incredible family.

### **TUAN**

For 15 long years, Tuan lived on a pig farm just 20km from our Vietnam sanctuary, but for this poor bear it was a world away from the paradise he would come to know. Tuan was morbidly overweight from an inappropriate diet of commercial pig food. He was weak and his muscles had atrophied.

**Our China bears** had 159 health checks under anaesthesia in 2019 - 90 at our Chengdu sanctuary and 69 at our Nanning rescue

Now that he's getting lots of exercise, Tuan is gradually getting in shape. He still has a big appetite, but now all his food is healthy



# TOGETHER UNTIL THE END

### Possum and Canberra died as they had lived, together

From the very first day they arrived at our China sanctuary in 2006, these beautiful bears were inseparable. Two peas in a pod, they often slept in the same basket bed, and always snuggled up to snooze through the long cold winter months together.

So, as sad as we were, when these best of girlfriends chose the very same day to let us know it was time for them to say goodbye, it seemed the most natural thing in the world.

Possum and Canberra had both seen a rapid decline in mobility, despite extra pain relief and other treatments. Then, on the very same cold morning in December, it became apparent that we had to end their suffering and let them go. We buried them side by side that same afternoon with their favourite toys and snacks, and flowering trees either side of their grave. You gave these bears a life they could never have dreamed of during their time of terror. Because of you, they grew old together in comfort and peace.



They healed hearts and changed minds, without having to say a word. They deserve our endless thanks, as do their lovely guardians.



Our Dr Dogs brought happiness to 9,395 people on 257 visits to hospitals, senior homes and centres for people with disabilities.

Our Professor Paws visited 5.762 school students in 99 activities. And our Cat and Dog Welfare teams held 70 public education events attracting over 4,400 people.

# WHERE CATS AND DOGS ARE ALWAYS ON **THE AGENDA**

NGOs from over 50 Chinese cities overcome challenges. joined our 7th China Companion Animal Symposium in 2019.

Our symposiums, held every two to three years, are where many of China's animal welfare groups meet to discuss issues affecting their work and how to

These include raising enough money to fund their shelters, working effectively with local officials, and organising volunteers.

We bring in experts to help, in 2019 inviting speakers on rescue methods, shelter management and capacity-building.

One great thing about our symposiums is the long-term relationships formed between NGOs. This is how long-term change is made.



# NOT JUST A SANCTUARY **FOR BEARS**

We're not sure if they're the *luckiest* or the smartest strays in China...

... but the lost cats and dogs who wander into our China bear sanctuary couldn't have found a better refuge.

Tara was hauled from a stream by our kind security guards. This poor dog was struggling so hard, her long limbs thrashing in the water, she could easily have drowned. But happily, her story ends well.

Thanks to a growing online network of animal lovers, Tara and the 20 other stray animals found at our sanctuary in 2019 now have loving homes.

Most were puppies, but we had some other adult dogs and kittens too. All animals we care for are vaccinated and neutered before going to their new families and, if they're too young to be de-sexed, we offer this free at a later date.

Rake-thin... filthy... matted fur... and trembling. Tara was a sorry sight when she was dragged from the water.





But after just a few weeks of tender love and expert vet care, a new and confident Tara emerged.



And now this gorgeous, gangly girl has a silky coat and her very own forever home. Another life saved, all because of your support

# PUBLIC SPEAKING UP FOR 'MEAT DOGS'

# Targeting the illegalities of dog meat restaurants

While it's not a crime to sell or consume dog meat in China, many restaurants are breaking the law by not having the required documentation like quarantine and transport certificates. So volunteers can report them to the authorities via our online campaign platform.

In 2019, three restaurants were forced to close thanks to these reports and 23 received warnings from the authorities.

Volunteers are also reporting animal abuse footage/dog meat products on popular online platforms like Taobao.com, Iqiyi. com and Tik Tok. 42 dog meat products were removed from sale on Taobao.com in 2019 after they were reported by volunteers. (Taobao promised to ban dog and cat meat products in 2011.)



The Chinese public – concerned about the welfare of animals and also their own health – are increasingly reporting dog and cat meat restaurants that ignore quarantine and hygiene regulations.



Events like this in Hanoi, where families bring along their much-loved dogs, are one important way we're spreading the message throughout Asia that dogs are our friends, not food.

# THEIR SAD EYES SAY IT ALL

The pleading eyes of dogs and cats trapped in Indonesia's meat markets will probably haunt Animals Asia Ambassador Peter Egan forever

But the Downton Abbey star is determined to expose the "sickening horrors" he witnessed at some of the country's most notorious live animal markets.

In 2019, Peter joined filmmaker Andrew Telling and campaigners from the Dog Meat Free Indonesia Coalition (of which we are a member) to document the cruelty at markets in North Sulawesi.

A year earlier, the coalition secured a pledge from the government to ban the trade in cat and dog meat. But a lack of enforcement means the industry is still thriving in some areas.

Thousands of dogs and cats are killed each week at the markets in North Sulawesi alone.

Thank you, Peter, for speaking up for these desperate animals.

Despite the size of the trade (around a million dogs and cats are killed each year), only around 7% of Indonesians eat dog or cat meat.

Around 80% of Indonesia's "meat dogs" are imported from other provinces, which is illegal under the country's anti-rabies laws.



Most of the dogs and cats are slaughtered in front of their cage mates.

# STILL MUCH WORK TO BE DONE

# Widespread misunderstanding of cat and dog trade

Our 2019 online survey suggests that around 64% of Chinese people still believe (wrongly) that farming is the main source of cat and dog meat.

And more than seven out of 10 of the 1,500 people surveyed said they wouldn't consume dog and cat meat if they knew the meat was from poisoned pets or stolen strays (as most of it is).

So, with your kind support, this is an issue we'll be campaigning on more in future.



These poor trusting dogs don't know the horrors in store for them yet. Most dogs who end up in meat markets are stolen pets or strays. However the public still believe most meat dogs are bred on farms.

In 2006, there were just 30 animal welfare groups in China. Today there are more


than **200**. Animals Asia funds or mentors 60% of these organisations.

**30,000** shelter animals in 67 government and NGO shelters in China have benefitted from your kind help. This includes food, vaccines, dog beds and shelter improvements.

Bun Kham couldn't be happier with her new life. And her original mahout (carer) was invited to join the ethical tours, so he still has an income.

# Progress is slow and steady like the buffalo

For the first time in years, Vietnam's annual Do Son Buffalo Fighting Festival was *not* broadcast on national TV.


And only half the number of buffaloes will be used in future events compared with previous years.

"Of course any progress is good, but this doesn't go far enough. Even one buffalo caused unnecessary suffering is too many. We won't stop until all these gentle, innocent animals are safe."

Vinh Phuc Province didn't hold its annual buffalo fighting festival in 2020 because of the coronavirus outbreak. We're hoping public pressure will discourage the province from holding the event again in future.

Before they fight, buffaloes are deliberately goaded and made angry by their owners, and their horns are sharpened to cause maximum damage.



To help change public attitudes to buffalo fighting and other cruel events like ritual pig slaughter, in 2019 we ran an art competition open to everyone in Vietnam. The top 15 entries, including 27-year-old winner Ms Nguyễn Cẩm Anh's striking work here, were sent to relevant officials and festival organisers in Vinh Phuc Province, Hai Phong City and Bac Ninh Province, all places where buffalo fighting or other cruel spectacles are held.



We're so grateful to the kind-hearted people at **VZUT** in Switzerland. Each year at Christmas they prepare handmade goodie bags, including a vegan version, to sell and raise money for Animals Asia. This is on top of their regular fundraising activities throughout the years. VZUT are our European Andrew Award winners for 2019.

# HE WAS ADVERTISED FOR SALE

Vietnam is home to five macaque species, all at risk from illegal hunting and habitat destruction. Poached macaques end up as exotic pets or circus performers.

### That's when we rushed in

Thanks to you, when a social media post offered male macaque Lit for sale, we were able to step in.

And when someone found female Tet in their garden with a leg wounded so badly it had to be amputated, you allowed us to offer her a home.

Now, because of your kindness, both Lit and Tet are safe at a shelter we co-manage in Yok Don National Park. They live happily with five other rescued macaques.

Your kind support allows us to fund and mentor young groups like Indonesia's Scorpion Foundation, which was set up in 2015. The group has since worked with the Indonesian Wildlife Authority to rescue over

**50** protected animals including orangutans, gibbons and birds.

# YOU'RE EASING THE PAIN FOR ANIMALS

Our vet teams – considered world experts in pain management – are sharing their knowledge and experience with vets and vet students throughout China and Vietnam

And the outcome will be happier animals, no longer forced to endure unnecessary pain, sometimes for many years. All thanks to your generosity.

We asked our trainees to take a survey before they started. The results show just how much your support is needed. Here's an example from 2019:

### Jiangsu Province, China

- 75 of 150 vet students had heard of animal welfare
- 0 of the 150 had heard of the five freedoms (the universal checklist for animal welfare that includes freedom from hunger, thirst and discomfort)
- Most vets (in a group of 60) used some form of pain-relief pre-surgery, but were inconsistent in using it during and postsurgery
- There was zero understanding of pain management for chronic pain (long-term)

Your support of our vet training courses means less pain for animals throughout China and Vietnam.



Did you know? All sunbirds are songbirds, but not all songbirds are sunbirds. Songbirds include around

**4,000** species and make up nearly half the world's bird population.



Animals Asia's partner, FLIGHT, rescued over 1,000 sunbirds from smugglers in Indonesia in 2019. These particular birds are crucial to pollination in the country's forests. The latest rescues bring to over 10,000 the number of birds rescued and returned to the jungle by the group since it was set up two years ago.

When the UK's **Silvana Sgarbini** lost her job a few years ago, instead of wallowing in self-pity, she opened a shop to help animals. Sadly, Silvana recently had to close "Cisky's Helping Animals In Need", but not before raising a lot of much-needed funds for Animals Asia and other animal charities. Silvana is our 2019 Andrew Award winner for the UK.


# FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


We didn't know it then, but as 2019 came to a close, an unprecedented crisis was looming, one that would make the previous year's enormous challenges look like a walk in the park.
